

#### **CANVASS PLANNED**

A \$500,000.00 fund raising campaign is being launched to finance the expansion of the Brevard College plant, it was announced to-day by President Robert Stamey.

The money is to be used to construct and equip a College Center building that is estimated to cost \$300,000.00 and a Music and Fine Arts building that will cost around \$200,000.00, he explained.

These two new buildings are regarded as being extremely essential in order to accommodate prop-erly an enrollment of from 400 to 500 students, which has been made possible by the construction of new men's dormitory and an addition to the women's dormitory.

Both of these facilities are practically completed and will be ready for use this fall. It is estimated that dormitory enrollment this year will be around 400 and daytime students about 100.

The College Center building will include an auditorium with a seating capacity of 500, a cafeteria and kitchen facilities adequate to serve 550, college administrative offices, bookstore, post office, and soda shop. Construction has ac-tually started on this building in anticipation of a successful final drive.


