Representatives Of Community Are Heard At Two Meetings In Past Week

Although no "concrete" evidence was presented last Friday morning or on Tuesday night at meetings of the WNC Officials association with representatives of Brevard, the group has refused to lift the 1year probation placed on Brevard following the Brevard-Hendersonville game, when it was alleged that local players, coaches and fans displayed unsportsmanlike

Head Coach Wayne Bradburn, who is also acting principal of the Brevard high school and president of the Blue Ridge conference, requested the executive body of the WNC Officials association to drop the charges against the local school and the community.

He said he was not guilty as charged of intimidating the officials and the association has not given the true facts. He contended that the action of the officials group was too hasty and that "Brevard was tried and convicted without being given an opportunity of being heard".
