The committee, composed of more than 50 heads of various organizations of Transylvania, is headed by Ralph H. Ramsey, Jr., county attorney, who presided over the dinner meeting.

On motion by Joseph S. Silver-steen, pioneer industrialist in Transylvania, the group voted to back the school bond issue as a body and as individuals.

Plans were made to "get out the vote" in all sections of Transylvania, and a vast amount of public ity material is being distributed.

F. S. Best, a member . of the board of educaton, outlined the need for a modern high school here, and he explained that comstruction is now underway on the Silversteen gym at Rosman, and the T. C. Henderson school Quebec is nearing completion.

He further explained that a new high school here, which will be modern in every respect and to contain vocational facilities, need-ed laboratories, etc., would relieve the overcrowded conditions in the elementary grades in and around Brevard and in lower Transylva
