OVER 1,300 GET POLIO SHOTS IN SCHOOL CLINICS

Good Response Is Also Re-ported At Health Office. Breakdown Is Given

More than 1,300 school children have received the Salk vaccine since the current series of polio shots were started in the schools, Dr. John Folger, county health officer, reports.

The response is far above expec tations, and by the time the clinics are completed, some 1,800 students will have been vaccinated, he

Another surprise is the fact that 707 persons have received the Salk vaccine in the health office here during the first two months of '57, Dr. Folger continues. Last year the total number of the same two months was 203.




