SENATOR SAM ERVIN SAYS

WASHINGTON — The extent to which the underworld has been able to corrupt officials and organizations is currently being demonstrated by the hearings conducted before the Senate Racketeering Committee.

Threat Of Vice

Our committee has been continuing its investigation of this sordid activity. I am certain that you have been following the hearings; I will not outline here the evidence we have heard. There is one thing that all good citizens should learn with renewed emphasis. It is that the tentacles of crime and the underworld can corrupt in high and low places and that the battle against vice and corruption is a threat to legitimate organizations. In this particular phase of our investigation, we have been inquiring into the activities of some of the leaders of the Teamsters Union and their tie-in with the underworld. It must be shocking for the law-abiding members of this union to learn of the apparent deep penetration of the underworld into their union in the Pacific Northwest. It must also be shocking to the good people of Portland.

Fullbright Gives Tips For Faster Mail Service Here

Says Earlier Mailing In The Day Speeds Delivery All Along The Line

Acting Postmaster Vernon P. Fullbright said today that mailers of Brevard can often speed delivery of their mail as much as a full day by depositing it earlier in the day.

Explaining that many local mailers, particularly businessmen, needlessly hold their daily mail until the end of the day and then deposit it in the post office or mail box, Postmaster Fullbright said these advantages would be realized if the patrons would mail earlier and more often in the day:

1. The mail that is deposited earlier will frequently make same day transportation connections, whereas, if it is deposited late in the day, it may sometimes have to wait until the next morning before it goes out.
2. The chances of human error in handling the mail earlier in the day when the post office is not deluged with work are reduced.
3. Deposit of mail earlier in the day will benefit the local post office and postal employees, enab-

ling them to spread out their work over a longer period of time and helping to reduce jam-ups and emergencies that may delay local deliveries and outgoing dispatches of mail in some instances.

"I urge all mailers, particularly larger mailers, to make deposits of mail earlier in the day—in the morning and early afternoon, for example," Postmaster Fullbright said. "It will often mean important advantages for them and will help us greatly."
