Although no definite word was available that the board would take up the option and buy the property, the general feeling seemed to be that they would follow through with it.

Fires Are Set In Pisgah, FBI Now Working On Cases

Around 20 incindiary fires were set in the Gloucester-Balsam Grove section of Pisgah National Forest Sunday night. Ranger Ted Seely says they burned over about 10 to 12 acres of national forest land.

Because of the rainy weather, the fires were brought under control about 8 a.m. on Monday morning.

Ranger Seely says the fires were definitely set and bloodhounds were put on the trail. They tracked the "firebugs" out to the highway, a distance of about two miles. He says that they have secured some evidence and the FBI is working on the cases of setting.


