

LOCAL BILLS ARE PASSED BY HOUSE

Would Extend Term Of Mayor, Aldermen And Raise Pay. Other Measures

Transylvania's representative, lames C. Gaither has introduced wo local bills in the legislature uring the past week.

One bill would extend the term the mayor of Brevard and the ve aldermen to four years, inead of two.

The major's salary would also be ncreased from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per nnum, and the aldermen would reeive \$300 each per year.

In addition, the aldermen would receive \$15.00 each for special neetings of the board. At the present time, the board members get \$10 for regular meetings and \$8.00




