Shotgun Blast Near Rosman Ends Row, Puts Five In Hospital And One In Jail

Condition Of Victims Said Improved. Several Warrants Are Issued

Five persons, including a fiveyear old girl, were wounded by a shotgun blast at Lloyd Kinsey's in the Diamond Creek section of Transvivania above Rosman last Wednesday about Aldnig following an argument.

The wounded were brought to the local hospital, and their condition today is reported by authorities as being satisfactory.

Sheriff "Scott" Dillingham arrested Johnny Morgan, 25-year old man who resided at the Kinzey house, following the shooting. He was charged with assault with a deadly weapon, and has been released on a bond of \$500. The sheriff says that warrants have also been issued for the other persons involved in the incident.

The victims were Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Kinsey: their daughter, Laverne; R. V. Galloway and Nelson Page, about 42, of Rosman, Page, less seriously hurt, was taken to the veterans' hospital.


