



Last December Transylvania voters approved a school bond issue of \$647,000, and with this money and other appropriations on hand, a new high school plant here, to cost approximately one million dollars, will be erected in the next two years.

A 30-acre tract, the V. L. Tinsley property or more familiarly known as the "Gallamore place" on the Country club road, was purchased this spring as the site for the ew and modern high school.

Over the period of 180 school days, the total mileage of the buses runs to 205,200 miles, and during the past year, only one day was missed because of bad weather. The percentage of Transylvania

county students which travel to and from school by bus is 58 percent. Of the total enrollment of 4,031 there are 2,519 bus riders.

"It has been definitely established that riding a school bus in this county is safer than walking on the highways," Supt. J. B. Jones

Of the 33 school bus drivers in Transylvania, there are 23 student drivers and 10 adults. The records of both are equally as good.

The monthly wage scale for the school bus driver is only \$59.50, which makes it difficult on a statewide basis to secure competent drivers, but Transylvania has always been most fortunate, Mr. Jones de-


