Locals Lost To Valley Springs, Chastine, Tesnow Star At Plate

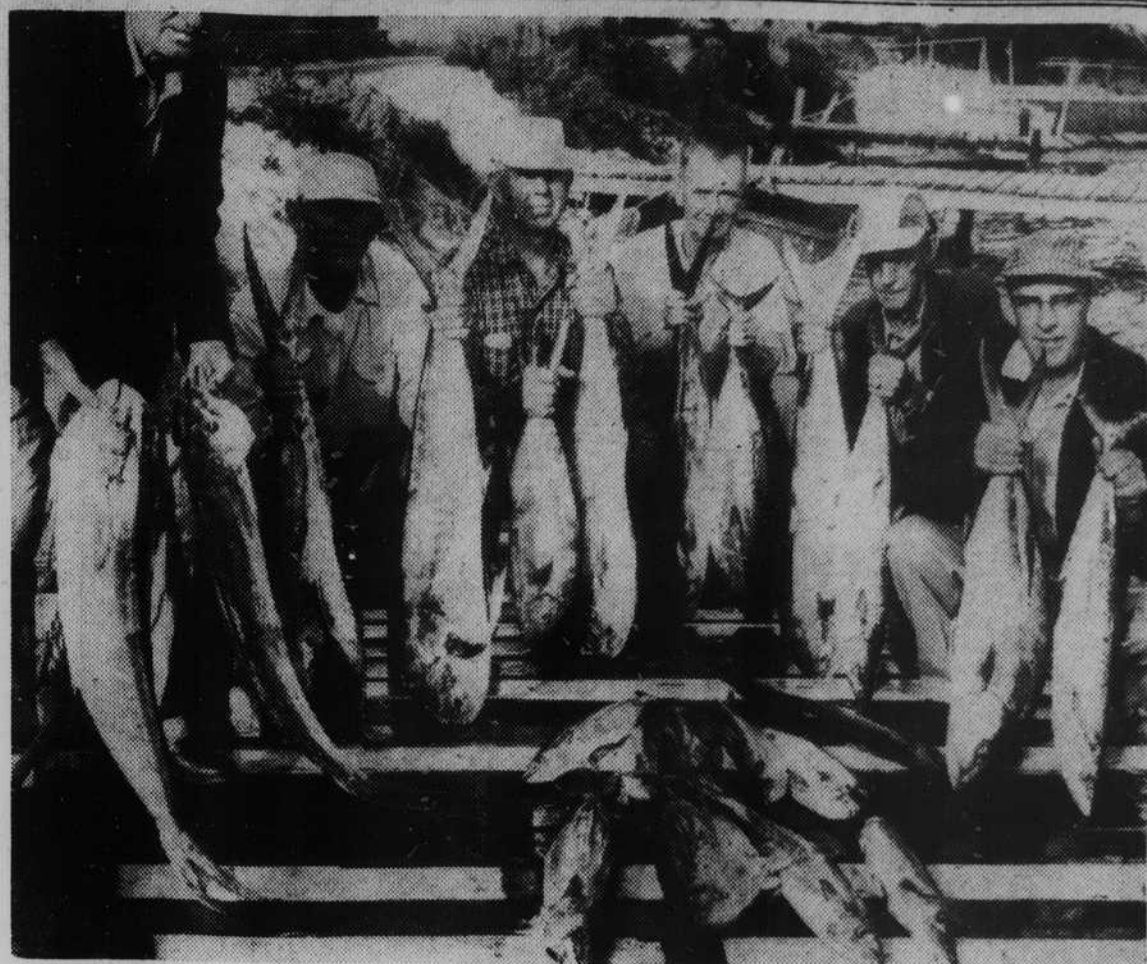
Olin Mathieson's Indians travel to Enka Saturday for a regular Western North Carolina Industrial league game.

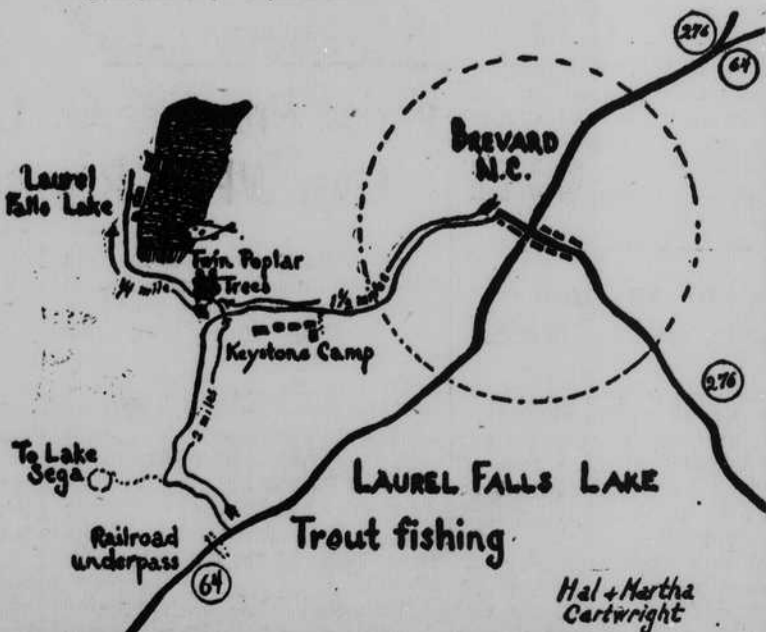
