BUILDINGS CONNECTED

Plans for a modern Brevard High School building were presented by the architectural firm, McDonald and Daniels, to the Transylvania board of education last Friday night.

These plans were enthusiastically approved by the board and will now be sent to Raleigh for final approval. Supt. Wayne Bradburs, who recently visited a number of new schools in North Carolina, reported to the board the plans were the finest he had seen and forecast that other counties building in the future would probably "beat a path" to Transylvaria to see this modern campus layout.

This type of construction gives maximum ventilation and light, and the beauty of it is the ease in which future additions can be made.

Final approval of these plans, working drawings and specifications, is expected shortly after the first of the year when the board will advertise for bids. It is estimated that 12 to 18 months will be required for building."


The capacity of this new school building is 800 students, and it will con ah 20 classrooms.
