Commenting on the significance of National Letter Writing week, Mr. Fullbright pointed out that each year since 1938 this event has been observed as a reminder of the real meaning of a personal letter. Emphasizing the traditional sanctity of the letter mail, Mr. Fullbright reminded Brevard residents that one of the basic American freedoms is the uncensored transmission of their first class mail. It is the most valuable possession of the citizens of a free country. "We all know the human importance of letter writing," Mr. Fullbright stated, "the way in which it holds scattered families together, of giving comfort and love and news to all the people of the land. But its value is immeasurably greater than that. Its implications are almost infinite. "We in America have the privilege of uncensored and unlimited means of communication. With this
