

Highway officials reported to the Times Wednesday morning that repair work to the badly damaged highways in this county is proceeding as rapidly as possible.

Patch crews are working daily on US Highway 64 from Brevard , to Hendersonville, they stated.

The extreme wintry weather and the prolonged freezes have caused many of the bottoms of the roads to "drop out", in Transylvania and across North Carolina, the officials




