

New 64 To Be Resurfaced. **Jaycees Given Franklin Park Project**

PARKING LOT LEASED

The new four-lane highway which is now being hardsurfaced from the entrance to the Pisgah National forest to the city limits in front of Radio Station WPNF, will be continued into the heart of Brevard immediately, the town board of aldermen decided at its meeting Tuesday night at the city hall.

The to vn attorney was instructed to write Paul Depree, assistant district engineer at Sylva, authorizing the work.

Webb Pittillo, district maintenance superintendent, met with the board and said the state was ready to begin the work right away. This project will include the widening and resurfacing of the highway from the city limits to Probart (at the jail).

It was announced in Raleigh on Tuesday that the new Highway 64, running from the entrance of the Pisgah National forest to Horse Shoe, would be resurfaced this summer. This work would be simultaneous with the paving of the 3.5-mile stretch into Brevard. The distance of the new highway 64 te Horse Shoe is 11.09 miles.

Other Action

Tentative plans are being worked out by the board of alderman with the Jaycees for opening and operating of Franklin Park. Another meeting has been set for this week, and the aldermen have allocated \$1,500 for the project.


