

Three Units Qualify Town For Armory. Funds Being Appropriated

SHUFORD ADVISES

A four-acre site in Brevard has been approved for an Army research center, Congressman George Shuford advises today.

The tract of land, which is ideally situated on the south side of French Broad street and the east side of Johnson, is owned by Mrs. A. A. Towers, and it was recently inspected by a delegation from the U. S. Army, headed by Lt. Col. Lee James, of Asheville.

Having three reserve units, Brevard meets the qualifications for an armory, and some two years ago, congress appropriated \$68,000 for this project if a site could be acquired
