Ranger Seely Releases Details On Annual Event. **Also Opening Dates** 

A meeting of officials of the U. S. Forest Service and the North Carolina Wildlife Resources commission was held in Asheville Tuesday and plans were approved for hunts that will be held in the wildlife management areas in the fall of 1958.


The schedule for rifle still hunts for antlered deer and bear will be November 17-22 and 24 through 29, according to Pisgah Ranger Ted S. Seely.

Applications in advance will be required for wilderness hunts and the first two days of the Pisgah big game hunts.
