# New Postal Rates To Yield \$15,000 At Brevard PO, Effective August 1st Herzog And Brownell Make Joint Announcement.

Fullbright Cites Breakdown
Of Revised Charges.

effective August 1, will cost local mailers an estimated \$15,000, according to Acting Brevard Postmaster Vernon P. Fullbright.

The penny increase in first class mail, from three cents to four \$11,000, Mr. Fullbright said.

In addition the increase on postal cards will bring in an additional \$2,000 and that on third class enue, bringing the total to \$15,000. ing up the first district.

The penny postal card which has two-cent card will be three cents. Airmail, not exceeding eight

ounces, will become seven cents an ounce. Air post and postal cards will be five cents each.

Third class mail, including unscaled printed greeting cards, will be three cents for the first two ounces, and 11/2 cents for each additional ounce. The weight limit for third class mail is increased to 15

Details on changes in other postal rates may be obtained from the acting postmaster.






