

James M. Wulpi, executive director, outlined an amendment that would require institutional members of the local organization to furnish a report of expenditures to the budget committee.



CORN, TOBACCO AND BEAN CROPS **ARE HARDEST HIT**

Survey Is Made By County Agent. List Of Farms Is.

PATH OUTLINED

A terrific hail and wind storm hit a wide section of the Little River community last Friday afternoon, doing an estimated damage of over \$40,000 to the corn, tobacce and bean crops.

Accompanied by a heavy, washing rain, the storm covered an area approximately two miles in length and one mile wide.

The path of the storm was from a point near the Freeman Nicholson farm up the beautiful Little River Valley for a distance of approximately two miles.

According to James Davis, the ccunty agent, the corn crop was hit the hardest. Some 400 acres suffered from one half to a total

Approximately 12 acres of bur-

ley tobacco were "laid low", and the yield of nearly 25 acres of beans was cut from 25 to 50 percent, he The Little River section of the

county was the only part of Transylvania hit by the storm. However, a heavy rainfall was recorded in most of the area. Among the farms hit by the
