According to government statis tics the cost of living has gone up 105 per cent in the last 20 years. People now pay \$2.05 for something that they could buy for a dol

lar back in 1938. Government experts' data shows that from 1938 to 1943 consumer costs rose 23 per cent; from 1943 to 1948, 39 percent; from 1948 to 1953, 11 per cent; and from 1953 to 1958, 8 per cent.

For example, the cost of gas and electricity rose only a little over 11 per cent, while coal and fuel oil jumped 129 per cent.

Transylvania's school officials are now busy preparing for the opening of schools on Sept. 2nd, and the various principals returned to their work on Monday, Supt. Wayne Bradburn announces.

A meeting of the principals and teachers is set for Sept. 1st, and a half-day session of schools is slated en Sept. 2nd. Full-scale operations will begin on the following day.

Supt. Bradburn reported yesterday that there is one teacher vacancy in the school system, that being the fifth grade at Brevard elemen-

In all, the county is assigned 120 teachers, plus two district principals, seven individual school principals, four vocational instructions, tv o music teachers and a supervis-

Robert T. Kimzey is principal of district one, and E. F. Tilson is disrict two principal.

A definite increase in enrolln ent is foreseen in the school system, especially here at Brevard high school.
