

Project Will Include Paved Parking Area. Completion **Date Next August**

Bids for construction of a 100nan U. S. Army Reserve Training center in Brevard will be received n November 19 in the Wilmington office of the Corps of Engineers.

The building will be one-story and contain approximately 4,300 square feet of floor area.
