Judge J. B. Craven, Jr., of Morsanton, is presiding over the civil session. The criminal term which was heard last week before Judge George M. Patton, of Franklin, was

adjourned last Friday. All the evidence in the Woody-Pickelsimer case was presented on Monday and Tuesday, and the lawyers on both sides were slated to make their pleas before the jury on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning.

The remainder of the civil docket will be tried on Thursday and briday of this week.

The Woody-Pickelsimer grew out of the sale of stock by Mrs. Pickelsimer to Mr. Woody in the Transylvania Trust company. It has been pending since 1949, and the sale took place in October,
