Provisions Of Act Are Outlined. Requirements Also Reviewed

DATES SUGGESTED

In a special meeting Tuesday night, the Brevard board of aldermen unanimously voted to request the General Assembly to pass a bill calling an election to determine whether residents of Brevard desire a town manager.

The proposed bill, which has already been delivered to Senator B. W. Thomason and Representative James C. Gaither, will require the board to call a special election prior to July 1, 1959, for the purpose of deciding the question. Consensus of the board seemed to be that, if the bill is passed in time, the election date will be set at the regular meeting of the board on June 1st. Since three weeks public notice is required, the election is expected to be set during the week of June 22nd, probably on Saturday, the 27th.

The bill provides for a modified "Plan D" form of town manager government. If passed upon by a majority of those voting in the election, the present system of electing five aldermen at large and a mayor who acts as judge over the Mayor's Court would be unchanged. However, all the administrative matters of the town would be under the authority of the town manager. The bill would require that the town manager be chosen by the board of aldermen solely upon the basis of his executive and administrative qualifications with special reference to his actual experience in, or his knowledge of, accepted practice in respect to his office.


