Over 10 inches of rainfall were recorded in Brevard during the month of May, in contrast with the monthly average of around five inches. The exact amount was 10.17 inches, with four twenty-four hour periods recording an inch or more.

Brevard's weather charts, dating back to 1952, show no month of May to equal this reading, and no single month has produced this amount of precipitation since the fall of 1957.
