An exhibition of musical lore has been provided by Corydon Bell, of Sapphire, for the Friends of the Library, and it will be on view during the month of July at Transylvania county library.

The exhibit, coinciding with the opening of the Transylvania Music camp, inculdes many unique items from Mr. Bell's personal files and library, which will be of interest to concert goers and musicians alike.
