

NEW HIGH SCHOOL TO BE COMPLETED BY SEPTEMBER 1ST

959 Law Requires Teachers And Pupils Report Earlier Than Usual

DATES GIVEN

Due to a slight delay in the construction of the new Brevard high school, the opening of schools in district one will be delayed one week, the board of education decided this week.

Schools in district two will open on August 27th as previously scheduled. These include the schools at Rosman and T. C. Henderson.

September 3rd is the date that has been set for the opening of the Brevard schools and others in district two.

Supt. Wayne Bradburn announces that the Department of Public Instruction at Raleigh has made some changes in reference to the opening of schools.

Actually, the changes require that the teachers report for duty two days earlier than they have in the past, and that students are to report one day earlier for "teacherpupil orientation day."

In district two, the teachers will report on August 25th for "teacher orientation day", and students will be required to attend school on August 26th when class assignments will be made; books issued, etc.

In district one the teachers will report on Sept. 1st, and students will attend the various schools for brief sessions on the following day.
