

listing during January. According to Lewis Osborne, tax supervisor, listing will begin on Jan. 2 in the different townships of Transylvania and will continue through January 10th.

After that time, listing must be done here in the court house. Mr. Osborne urges residents of Transvlvania to list early the property on which they're going to pay taxes in 1959.

A penalty is prescribed by law for those persons who fail to list.

Property that must be listed falls into four major categories: 1. All real estate and tangible personal property owned on January 1st. 1960.

2. A poll, or capitation, tax required of all male persons between the ages of 21 and 50 as of the first of the New Year.

3. Every dog, male or female, more than six months old owned or kept on the first.

4. Farm reports. The tax listers for the townships are as follows: Brevard-Miss Avarie Glazen-


