

Fire Losses In Brevard During '59 At A New Low Since 1946, Survey Made Board Tuesday



During the month of January, all ounty property and farm reports nust be listed. The tax supervisor avs there is a penalty prescribed v law for failure to do so.

Property that must be listed falls nto four major categories:

1. All real estate and tangible personal property owned on January 1st, 1960.

8. A poll, or capitation, tax required of all male persons between he ages of 21 and 50 as of the first of the New Year.

3. Every dog, male or female, nore than six months old owned or ept on the first.

4. Farm reports.

Repair Work On Streets, Etc., Is Slated

The town board of aldermen began the New Year with a busy meeting on Monday night at the City hall, with Mayor B. H. Freeman presiding.

Probably heading the list of outtanding accomplishments was the earning of approximately \$1,143.00 through the debt service fund.

This is the story:

Town manager Tom Henry reported on the debt service of the town and requested depositing debt service funds and others so they might be drawing interest. He pointed out that the town debt was \$598,000 and that debt service principal and interest had been paid up to date.

The next date on which the town can pay on the Debt Service Refunding Bond issue is July 1, 1960, and by investing this money held for that purpose in savings accounts at the First Union National bank and Brevard Federal Savings and Loan, the money will earn approxi-mately \$1,143.00 interest before the bond payments are due. The manager informed the board that the N. C. Statutes would be complied with since both of these lending institutions are covered to \$10,000 by Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation on each account entered. The town manager was authorized to make the deposits upon the approval of the city attorney.

The request for loan transfers of a maximum of \$5,000 from Powell Bill Fund to General Fund was authorized to be transferred back before June 30th.
