

The district supevisor pointed out that under census-law, all persons 18 years old and over are required to answer official Census questions. The same law specifies that personal information collected by census takers must be kept confidential. The person who willfully refuses to answer the official census questions is subject to a maximum fine of \$100 or 60 days in jail, or both.
