

### Gaither Is Still **Undecided About Run-Off Race**

Transylvania Democrats, more han 3,000 in number, turned out in the Primary election in the town and county last Saturday and nominated candidates for county, state and congressional posts.

Voting was heavier than anticiated, except in the Republican priary; in which there were only 281 oters participating.

As in other Western North Caroina counties there were a number of upsets locally.

Jack Potts, Brevard attorney, deleated incumbent James C. Gaither, with a vote of 1,329 to 1,121. Wood Faxton, the third candidate in the race, polled 773.

At noon on Wednesday, Mr. Gaither was undecided as to calling a run-off.

Incumbents, Freeman Hayes and Dewey Burton, were unseated in the Board of Commissioners. The other member of the board, Dwight Moffitt, ran third, and he was nominated along with C. Few Lyds and R. M. "Bob" Boyd.

Lyda had 2,032 votes; Boyd, 1,964; Molfitt, 1,772; Hayes, 1,693; and Burton, 1,360.

In other local races the incumbents were victorious.

C. M. Douglas, tax collector, was enominated with a vote of 1,938 to 1,294 for Joel M. Hubbard.

Owen G. Lee, register of deeds, lefeated W. F. Short by a vote of 1,913, to 1,295.

Harry F. Morgan, member of the county board of education, polled the highest number of votes in the election with 2,137. Nominated to fiil the other vacancy was D. S. Winchester, also of Rosman, who had 1,993. Gil Coan ran third high with 1,510.

Don Y. Wilson, Jr., was nominated for constable of Brevard township over Don A. Lance. The ete was 1,264 to 540.
