# Two South Carolina Convicts Nabbed By Officers Here Tuesday Morning

were captured here in a Brevard rooming house shortly before noon on Tuesday by local officers and Sheriff Paul Hill and two of his deputies from Henderson county.

The men were identified as James Duncan, 18-year old white, male youth, and Charles Payne, age 20, also white.

They had made their get away from the Oneal Prison camp in Greenville county, South Carolina, Monday afternoon in a county dump truck while working with a road patching crew.
