Dramatic **Rescue By** Firemen

Roy Waldrop, who resides on the Camp Illahee road, was dramatically rescued by Brevard firemen last Saturday morning from the bottom of the 30-foot well at his home.

Mr. Waldrop, who was pre-paring to clean out the well, with the aid of his son, Travis, fell some 20 feet, when a borrowed rope broke as he lowered himself down.

His hip was shattered by a cement ledge at the water's level.

With lightning speed, his son used another rope and dropped to the bottom of the well to prevent his father from drowning.

The Brevard firemen rushed to the scene and expertly brought the two men to the surface.

Mr. Waldrop, the father, was given medical attention for his painful injuries and then taken to the local hospital.


