

Lake Toxaway, millionaires' vacation mecca in the Blue Ridge Mountains before it vanished nearly a half-century ago, will reappear within 60 days, its owners have announc-

Construction is moving rapidly on a new dam being built with modern engineering techniques for Lake Toxaway Estates, Ine. It will replace the original dam whose break in 1916 erased the resort from vacation maps

A half-million dollars worth of heavy equipment of A.P. White and Associates, Char-lotte ,is slicing off the top of mountain and moving specially-selected clay material to form the dam's base 350 feet thick. Giant drag pans loaded with tons of earth rumble down the mountainside to spread their loads, then roar again to the top while crawler tractors with sheepsfoot rollers pack the clay solid.

Old residents of the area who remember the mule-panmethod of moving dirt and rubble to the original dam find the contrast striking.

The new dam will rise 60 feet above the bed of the Toxaway River, impounding waters 50 feet deep at the dam. When the lake is filled to its 14-mile shoreline, water will flow over a solid granite spillway 60 feet wide. In addition, a 48-inch "drawdown" pipe will run be-neath the base of the dam, a feature lacking in the origi nal. The pipe can be used to lower the lake's level for main tenance purposes, or in case of emergency.

The lake bed, thicky grown up during the last half-century, is now more than half Mared again of pulpwood and saw timber. A local fire warden is supervising the burning -Turn to Page Eight
