(2) A poll, or capitation, tax required on all male persons between the ages of 21 and 50, as of the first of the year.

(3) Every dog, male or female, more than six months of owned or kept on the first.

(4) Farm reports.

Brevard, was found in the East Fork section of Transylvania last Friday morning lying in the ditch beside his pickup, and he apparently died of exposure to the bitter cold. Because of the icy roads, school officials closed all the schools in Brevard and Transylvania county last Thursday morning and they did not reopen until Monday of this week.
