Employees of Olin Mathieson hemical Corp. in Pisgah Forest oted almost four to one against epresentation by the United Papermakers and Paperworkers, AFL-CIO in an election held last Friday and Saturday in the plant at Pisgah Forest.

The official count showed that 401 employees voted against representation by the union while only 378 voted for the union. There were 1,888 employees eligible, of whom 1,806 voted. Union observers challenged 27 otes, but none were challenged by the company.
