The bid was \$282,215.70, and it was for 4.45 miles of grading basework, paving and structures. The route is known as the Tennessee Bald road, and it runs from the bridge over the North Fork of the French Broad river, north of Balsam Grove, southeast through Balsam Grove to a paved road.

When the scenic highway is completed, it will give Transylvania county an all-weather road from Rosman to the Blue Ridge Parkway.



Vast Progress Is Noted During The Recent Years

A long range plan for the fuare activities of the Transylania Community hospital is now being developed by Jacque orman, of Greenville, S. C., hospital consultant.

This announcement is made by John W. Bailey, administrator of the hospital, who stated that as Fransylvania county grows and develops, so must the hospital grow to take care of the county's needs

At the present time, the hospital can provide adequate serice. But during the past year, here have been many times when it operated at near capacity, and some patients were not able to obtain the private room they desired.

The Board of Trustees have studied the situation, and are planning for the future needs, according to Mr. Bailey.

Since the dedication of the Harry H. Straus wing of the hospital in 1954, the local institution has operated with a total bed compliment of 43 and maximum capacity of 49.

The nursing staff has been increased from six registered nurses to 11. The office staff has grown from one full time person and one part-time person to Charles L. Russell, public re- three full time persons. Two medical technologists are now on duty, as compared to one in 1954.

> The hospital has operated in the black since the fall of 1954. and at the same time it has kept up with the growing requirements of modern hospital operation.

The operating budget has grown from \$85,000 in 1954 to \$140,000 for this past year. The daily cost per patient has increased only slightly during this Vance Jackson, second vice time - from \$16.84 to \$18.00.


