# Brevard, Rosman High Schools **Notes On** Watershed Election

Since an election has been called in Transylvania on June 3rd to determine whether or not the commissioners shall levy a special tax for watershed development and improvement. The Times this week interviewed Lewis Hamlin, chairman of the Flood Control committee, and W. W. Brittain, secretary of the Soil conservation committee.

The questions and answers are as follows:

Q. What will be exact wording of the question that the voters will be asked to vote on?

A. "For watershed improvement tax of not more than 31/2c on \$100.00 tax valuation." "Against watershed improve-

ment tax of not more than 31/2 c on \$100.00 tax valuation." Schools met Monday night in project serve?


