Monday, the 28th, will be devoted primarily to registration, and the first full-day of classroom work is scheduled for the following day, Tuesday, Aug-

Supt. Bradburn also announced today that Transylvania will receive six additional teachers for the new term because of the increased allocation in Raleigh for education. This will give the county a total of 139 teachers.

Teachers are expected to receive their bonus checks at the end of August, and the amount is expected to be about the same as last year's.

The increase will become effective August 1, 1961.

Mail subscriptions will go up 50 cents per year, while the cost of a single issue will

be 10 cents.

After the first of August, subscription within the count will be \$3.50, while the cost
