



Report Given On Work Of Humane Society

A report on activities of the new animal shelter was heard at the regular monthly meeting of the Transylvania County Humane society Monday night.

Since the first of July, 42 cats have been handled. There were either picked up as strays, or were delivered to the shelter by the public. 20 of these were placed in homes as pets, and nine kittens are now at the shelter waiting for homes.

Some 73 of the 169 dogs picked up have been placed as pets, and the remainder have been humanely destroyed or are wait-

ing for homes at the shelter. Approximately 1100 dogs have been vaccinated since the rabies program was started last spring. The Society has made two investigations of cases of cruelty to —Turn To Page Four
