Henry McDonald, architect for the college, said that the contemporary features in the design of the new Physical Education building would harmonize with the modified Colonial style that has been adopted for the buildings in

the expansion program. Designed to provide facilities for all indoor sports, the building will house a regula tion swimming pool, basketball court, class rooms and offices. The latest equipment for therapeutic, including a whirl pool tank will be installed.

When the building is completed next August, Brevard College will have one of the best physical education plants in the southeast, according to President McLarty. The new tennis courts, baseball diamond and track which were constructed this summer are ready for use this semester.
