Advantages Are Cited By McCall, \$1,800 Received

The new General County Court in Transylvania got off le a good start on Monday.

Approximately 39 cases were disposed of, and many were bound over to Superior Court, Clerk of Superior Court Marvin McCall reports. Revenue taken in the court amounted to some \$1,800.00.

Cases that were tried on Monday were mostly of a minor nature, and concerned traffic violations.

Mr. McCall reports that the court will convene again next Monday, October 9th. He said he was well pleased with the opening day and he predicted that the court would be a great help to defendants. For example, the cost of drunk driving case was reduced from \$49.00 to \$24.00. The mandatory fine of \$100.00 stays the same

"This court will do much to reduce crime in Transylvania," Mr. McCall believes. He cites as an example a drunk driving case when the arrest was made on a Saturday. The case would be heard on the following Monday and the drivers licenso revoked at that time. Heretofore, the defendant could drive for several weeks before being tried in Superior Court.
