

### Election Tuesday, Canvass Thursday Two Issues Pass Locally, 14 **Precincts Report**

With 14 out of 18 precincts reporting, Transylvanians voted against eight of the 10 proposed bond issues in Tuesday's statewide election.

Across North Carolina, all of the measures were disapproved.

This stunning vote came as rebuke to the Sanford administration, which was calling for the issuance of \$61,665,000.00 in bonds to provide for capital improvements for state institutions and agencies

The Transylvania vote will the canvassed Thursday morning at 11:00 o'clock here in the Brevard court house.

The four boxes which did not port in on Tuesday night were loucester No. one and two, and Hogback No. one and three. A light vote was expected in these precincts.
