Nine Inches Of Rainfall Causes **Flooding Conditions In County**

Nine inches of rainfall in Brevard and Transylvania on Monday and Tuesday sent streams and rivers out of their banks and flooded the bottomlands in the county.

Since many of the secondary roads were closed because of the high water, schools in district one were recessed at noon on Tuesday. The Greenville highway was also closed.

While no major damages were reported, there were hundreds of flooded basements, leaking roofs and landslides along many of the roads.

Also, some 65 head of cattle were isolated on an island near Wilson's bridge, and the local rescue squad was called out. With the use of boats, they led them to safety. Some 13 head were also rescued on the Osborne farm, according to officials of the rescue squad.

Foreign Policy Blasted In Talk At Kiwanis Meet System In Brevard's Business Area Former Congressman Wood

row W. Jones blasted present U. S. foreign policy in an address delivered before the Brevard Kiwanis club last Thursday night.

Mr. Jones, a prominent Rutherfordton attorney who has been frequently mentioned as a pos-sible gubernatorial candidate in the next election, prefaced his remarks by praising Brevard and Transylvania county for noticable economic and social advances made in recent years. He also stated that the entire area would experience greater

growth than ever when new super highways could be constructed here in the mountains. "But," he said, "I do not know just when this construction will

start.

Speaking on foreign policy, Mr. Jones called on the nation's leaders to start spending more on re-armament and less on foreign aid to countries who "obviously are not willing to help themselves".

"It is time to quit fooling ourselves by thinking that we can support the whole world. We are draining our economic resources by trying to do this, when we eed those resources to build p the strength needed to keep the Soviet Union's desires of world conquest in check." He

Town Hall Is Renovated, **Board Has Meet**

A plan to improve the street lighting in the downtown business district of Brevard was approved by the Board of Aldermen at their meeting Monday evening.

The plan calls for Duke Power company to replace the present incandescent lights with 20,000 illumined mercury vapor lights on Main street between England and Johnson streets and on Broad street between Probart and Morgan

Officials of Duke Power company state that the work will begin as soon as materials have been received from Charlotte; and the project should be completed within three months.

In submitting the plan, Town Manager Bill Edens pointed out that the present system was installed more than 20 years ago. With the new plan, it will be possible to double the amount of light at the street level without materially increasing the cost, he stated.

"When work has been comoleted, Brevard's downtown lighting will compare favorably with that in the largest citles in the country," Mr. Edens, declared.
