On The Political Front

Political wars have started in Transylvania.

The showdown is set for Saturday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock in the court house here in Bre-

Two factions will fight it out to determine which group will control the election machinery for the 1962 primary and the General Election.

One faction headed by County Chairman Charles Russell, favors the appointment of T. J. Wilson of Pisgah Forest RFD, Mrs. Inez O. Whitmire of Brevard and the Rev. Ben F. Ormand of Brevard.

Thirteen members of the executive committee headed by Mys. Sue H. Wilson of Brevard, vice chairman, back Ralph Lyday, Brevard accountant, and George T. Perkins, Sr., Brevard business man, for appointment as Democratic members of the Transylvania board of el ations. This group did not recommend a third member but it is probable it will have one ready for Saturday's meeting of the county executive committee.

Chairman Russell Tuesday issued a call for the 22-member executive committee to meet Saturday at 4 p.m. in the court house to make its recommendations to State Democratic Chairman Bert Bennett.

Chairman Bennett directed Russell to call the second meeting because he said committee members were not given sufficient notice of the first meeting. Russell submitted the Wilson - Whitmire - Ormand recommendations and Mrs. Wilson the names of Lyday and

The new plan of organization, adopted by the state Demecratic committee Feb. 16, will govern Saturday's meeting. This means there will be 22. votes—18 precinct chair-men, county chairman, vice chairman, immediate past chairman and president of Young Democratic Club. Votby proxy will not be permitted.
