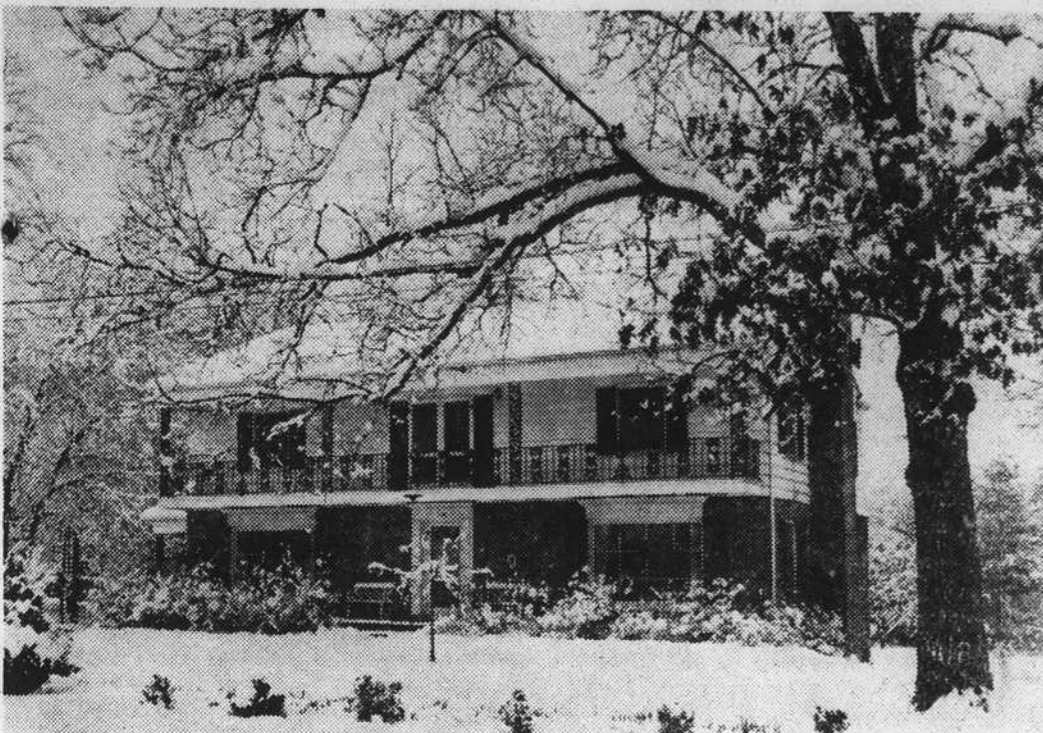

The regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday night in the library, with the appointment of committee chairmen and discussion of plans for the forthcoming annual banquet high on the agenda.

President Freeman Hayes named the following persons to head committees for the coming year: Leslie Grogan, industrial; E. K. McLarty, Jr., education; W. H. Keith, finance; James D. Davis, agricultural; James M. Wulpi, public relations; Charles F. Hines, banquet and entertainment; John A. Ford, highways; L. P. Hamlin, flood control; John R. Sledge, membership; Gil Coan, area promotion; Mrs. W. A. Wilson, beautification; W. S. Sagar, housing; and John Anderson and Al Martin, co-chairmen of publicity.

Tentative dates of either April 26th or 27th have been set for the annual chamber of commerce banquet. Final plans, including the name of the speaker and the actual date, will be released by chairman Charles Hines in the immediate future.

Industrial chairman Leslie Grogan reported that one industry had narrowed the possibilities of relocating their plant to the Brevard area and one other community. He also stated that several other industries were still showing interest in locating here.

The body passed a motion endorsing the idea of a city directory for Brevard. This will encourage the Hill Directory Company, of Richmond, Va., to survey the area and determine the possibility of printing a city directory for Brevard.

For November, 1961, total sales were \$1,082,741. These figures were obtained from The Retailer, the monthly publication of the North Carolina Merchants association at Raleigh.

Construction Begins On Machine No. 11

Demand for WAYLITE lightweight printing papers, a fast growing paper type, one-time carbonizing paper, used in the searing multiple-copy business forms industry, and papers for the tobacco industry will increase steadily and significantly in the coming decade, an industry executive predicted today.

During ground-breaking ceremonies marking the start of construction of the eleventh fourdrinier paper machine of the Ecusta Paper Operations of Olin Mathieson Chemical corporation, A. J. Loeb, division vice president, declared that the dovetailing of technological breakthroughs in fine papers with well established trends in this field was one of the major factors for his optimism.

As an example, Mr. Loeb pointed to increasing postal rates and the growth of direct mail advertising. Lightweight printing papers, with the whiteness, opacity, strength and printability of many papers twice their weight, are providing the answer to this increased cost of doing business, he explained.

Another solution, and an increasingly popular one, to the problem of how to hold the cost line, he noted, is the growing use of multi-copy business forms, frequently referred to as "snap outs." These consist of multiple forms with carbon paper already inserted between the forms by the forms manufacturer. The carbon paper is used but once. This expedites the preparation of multiple forms. — Turn to Page Seven

Tigers Have Tough Breaks In Play-Off

Fouls will beat you and no team knows that better than Rosman. The Tigers from Transylvania County were charged with 32 fouls in their District 8 Class A western division semifinal game with Cullowhee at Sylva Monday night and bowed to the Rebels, 80-57.

Cullowhee, by virtue of the win, will face Nantahala, 57-43, winner over Clyde in the semifinal nightcap, at Sylva Wednesday night for the western crown and right to play the eastern champs at Erwin High Friday night for the District 8 title.

Rosman dropped in 22 baskets from the floor compared to 20 for Cullowhee but that four point advantage was wiped out from the free throw line as the Rebels hit on 40 of 51 courtesy tosses.

Rosman had only 23 shots from the foul line and hit on 13. Cullowhee was charged with only 15 personals.

The Tigers lost four players on fouls and three others had four apiece. The 51 chances from the free throw line and 40 connections amount to a season's record in the basketball action this year.

At that, however, Cullowhee was never home free until the last period when they tallied 29 points to 17 for the losers. Charles McDonald led both clubs in scoring with 25 points. He hit on 15 of 16 free throws. Dillard Phillips hit for 22 to share the offensive spotlight. Joe McCall led the losers with 16.

The Brevard Methodist church in cooperation with the music department of Brevard college will present "The Invisible Fire" on Sunday morning, March 18th, during the regular 11:00 o'clock worship hour.

This contemporary oratorio about the life of John Wesley, founder of Methodism, was written by Dr. Cecil Effinger, well-known American composer, and the text was written by Dr. Tom Driver, professor of drama at Union Theological Seminary in New York.

The work was commissioned by the National Conference of Methodist Youth and was premiered at the National Methodist student conference in 1957. That year signified the 250th anniversary of the birth of Charles Wesley, the brother of John Wesley who is famous for his many hymns.

The title of this work refers to Wesley's famous "heart warming" experience which changed the direction of his life. The spectacular experience of his being saved from a real fire when his father's rectory burned to the ground in his early life is also referred to. His experience with the Moravians on ship board as he crossed the Atlantic ocean is also mentioned.

The performance on Sunday will be given by the Senior choir of the church and the college choir. Mrs. Louise Miller will play the orchestral reduction of the score at the organ.

Soloists will be Elaine McDonald, Martha Gibbs, and Frank McGuire. The part of Wesley will be sung by M. Thomas Cousins.

Nelson F. Adams, minister of music at Brevard Methodist church and head of the college department of music, will be the director.
