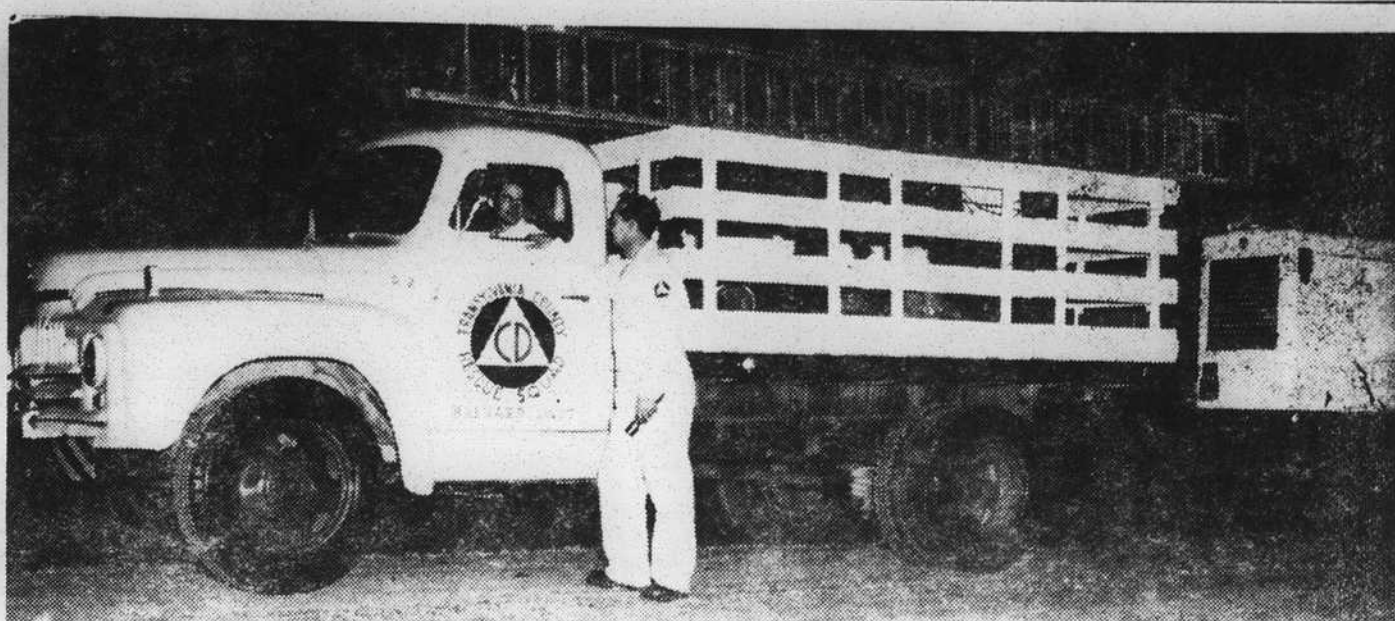
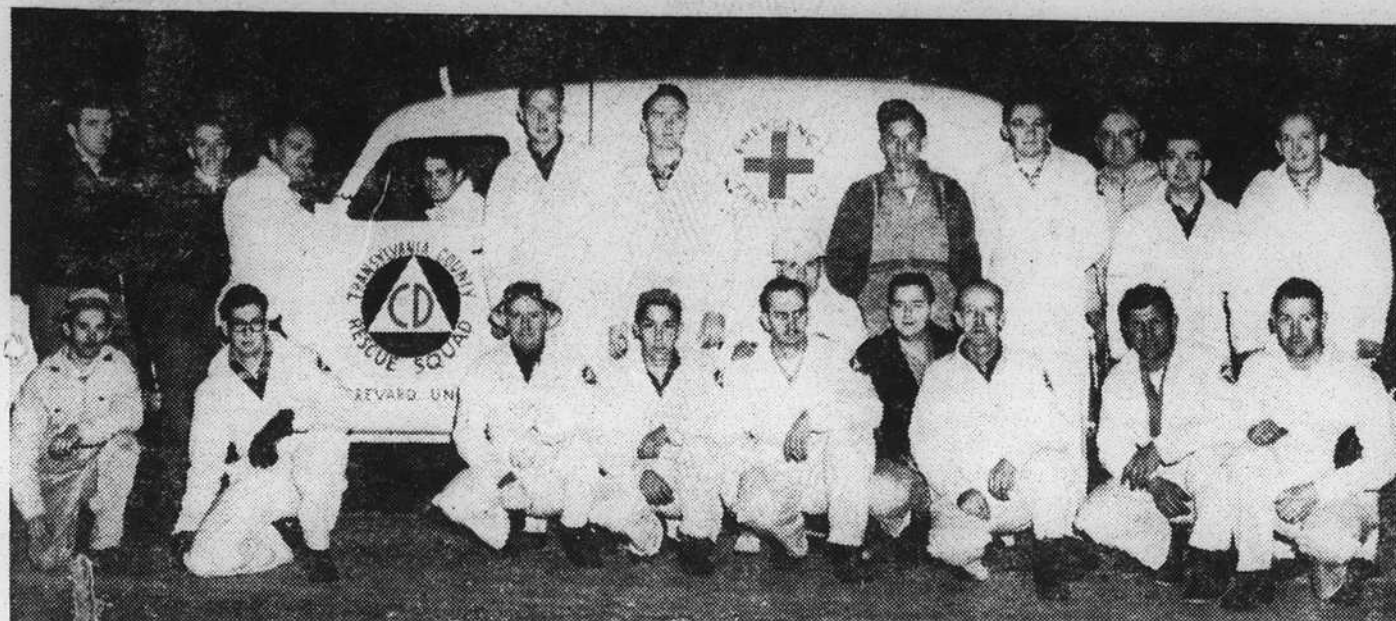


Brevard's Unit Of The Transylvania Rescue Squad Is Affiliated With Civil Defense

Mrs. Hamlin Will Be 103, 28th

Transylvania's oldest citizen, Mrs. Mary Tinsley Hamlin, will celebrate her 103rd birthday on March 28th.

Active in spite of her years, Mrs. Hamlin usually prepares two of her meals each day, does her own laundry and stays busy braiding rugs, quilting and sewing.

Until she broke her hip nine years ago, she took care of her yard and garden, did her shopping and was independent. Now she gets some assistance from her two children, Mrs. John Ashworth, who lives on Maple street, and Mrs. Marcus Miller, of Princeton, West Virginia, who spends several months each year with her mother.

"Granny" Hamlin was born in 1859 in a section of Henderson county that is now Transylvania, the daughter of the late Samuel and Elsie Nicholson Tinsley. In 1880, she married Augustus Hamlin, and 15 years later she was left a widow with six small children.

Event Will Be Staged Over Three-Day Period

Four months ago a handful of men came together with an idea — that Transylvania county needed a rescue squad.

Today that idea is a reality. During these four months, 21 men who are dedicated to serving the county through a rescue squad have spent countless hours in training for this exacting service and in gathering together equipment and supplies necessary for their services.

They have met in three-hour sessions one night each week undergoing training in first aid and rescue procedures. On Tuesday night of this week, 21 of them received their certificates.

Through the local civil defense chapter, they obtained a state body truck and a 30 KW light generator. Later they secured a first aid truck.

The men have worked more than 500 hours sanding, painting and readying equipment for action. They collect weekly dues to pay for materials needed for this repair work. They

High School Students Are Now Taking Road-E-O Exams

High school students from Brevard and Rosman high schools are taking written tests this week as one part of the teen age Road-E-O that is being sponsored by the Brevard Jaycees.

According to Road-E-O chairman Tom McCrary, the top 25 scores in the written test will be eligible to compete in the actual driving competition, which will be held on Saturday, April 14th.

The driving course is laid out to test the young driver's skill in backing an automobile, parallel

parking, maneuvering the automobile around a curved layout, etc.

"The purpose in having a Road-E-O here in our county is to help instill the fundamentals of safe driving in our young people," Chairman McCrary stated.

"If we thought that our efforts might possibly avoid one serious accident in the future, then certainly the time in staging the project will be well spent," he concluded.
