Soprano Irene Jordan, one of the true stars of the Metrolitan Opera, will be featured on Friday and Saturday evenings. Also on Saturday evening, a memorial program will be presented.

Jan Peerce, probably Ameri-ca's greatest tenor, will be the soloist Sunday afternoon

A coloratura soprano and a native of Birmingham, Alabama, Miss Jordan will sing Mozart's Motet, Exsultate Jubilate, on Friday evening, and Vittorio Giamnini's, The Medead on Saturday evening.

Also on Saturday evening, Miss Jordan will sing the soprano solo parts in the Faure Requiem.

The Medead was written especially for Miss Jordan by Giannini, who is dean of the new advanced division of the Brevard Music Center.

The composition is a fourmovement, 40 minute - long "monodrama" for solo soprano and symphony orchestra written for the singer under a 1959 Ford Foundation Grant which singled Miss Jordan out as one of the top 10 U.S. performing artists to whom the Foundation wished to show "public appreciation of the richness and variety of their highest level."

Five long - time friends of the Brevard Music Center and crash victims will be memorialized Saturday evening with the presentation of the Faure Requiem.

Morrison Named Manager, Will Succeed Grogan


As part of a shift in produc tion emphasis from silicon to photographic products at the DuPont company's Brevard plant, the company today appointed Albert B. Morrison, Jr., production manager of its photo products department to succeed Leslie S. Grogram of the pigments department as plant manager effective September 1st.

DuPont said that assumption of management of the Brevard facility by the photo products department coincides with the scheduled start-up of processing of photographic materials in October. Construction of additional photographic manufacturing facilities are in full swing at the Buck Forest site and these should be completed next year, at which time employment is expected to increase from 220 to about 450 persons. More than 500 are now engaged in construction.






