A breakdown of the permits reveals the following:

New residences-\$397,350.00

Commercial-\$151,700.00 Repairing or additions-\$42,-

A total of 29 new homes was built in the city limits during the year, and the commercial building permits issued totalled 15.

Some 27 permits were issued for repairs or additions.

The largest of the commercial buildings were Brevard Lumber company, Brevard Motor lodge and Duke Power company.
