### Donations And Pledges Are Being Solicited

A \$60,000 Brevard College Development program, to last over a period of three years, has been started in Brevard and Transylvania counties.

W. H. Keith is the campaign director, and the committee assisting him, which was appointed by the Brevard Chamber of Commerce, consists of John I. Anderson, Don Blankinship, Gil Coan, Arthur J. Loeb, Paul Owenby, Jr., Ralph H. Ramsey, Jr., and C. A. Butterworth, Jr., treasurer.

Mr. Keith says that letters containing brochures and pledge cards have been mailed to many, many persons, and others are being contacted personally and through the various civic clubs.

He stresses the importance of cash contribution accompanying the pledges over the three-year period, because only the paid portion will be applied to a matching contribution to Brevard College.
