# Nation's Top Travel Expert To Speak Here At Annual Commerce Banquet

The USA's Man of the Year in the travel industry - North Carolina's Voit Gilmore - will be the principal speaker at the annual banquet of the Brevard Chamber of Commerce on Friday night, March 8th.

The ladies' night affair will be held in the Masonic temple, and elaborate plans are being made for this auspicious occasion.

Mr. Gilmore, a resident of Southern Pines, is director of the United States Travel Service established in the Department of Commerce in 1961 for the purpose of improving the balance of trade by persuading more foreigners to visit

His success in establishing a world wide organization and increasing the flow of visitors from abroad is attested by the "Travel Man of the Year" award made annually by the American Motor Hotel association for the greatest achievement in the travel industry.

- (The U.S.A. was one of the few nations that did not have a national travel department)

- Gilmore got the "Visit U.S.A." campaign going full blast in only a year and a half. USTS now has offices in 10 key countries in Europe, South

America, Asia and the South

"In the short span of 18 months the U.S. Travel Service has gained an impressive foothold, unmatched in recent years by any comparable travel activity, government or private," wrote Editor Irwin Robinson of "Travel Weekly", a bible of the travel industy.
