## . Home Building Up 26%

The production of new housing in Transylvania county, over a 10 - year period. has been at a rapid pace, according to cumulative figures released by the government.

A larger proportion of the local dwellings was built during the past decade than was the case in many parts of the nation.

The facts and figures on the amount of new housing in the local area and in other communities across the country are contained in reports released by the Department of Commerce. They show that home building went on at a great rate. with records being set in many localities

In Transylvania county, ome 1,358 new dwelling some units were produced in the period. Taking into account the number of old houses that were eliminated to make room for new ones, the county ended with a total of 5,-199 units.

This wave of construction played an important part in the local economy, providing work for people in the various building trades as well as out lets for suppliers of building materials, appliances, home furnishings and the like.

The reports show that 26.1 percent of the homes now in use in Transylvania county were built since 1950.

The upsurge of building, locally and in other parts of the nation, is attributed in part to the easier financial -Turn to Page Seven


